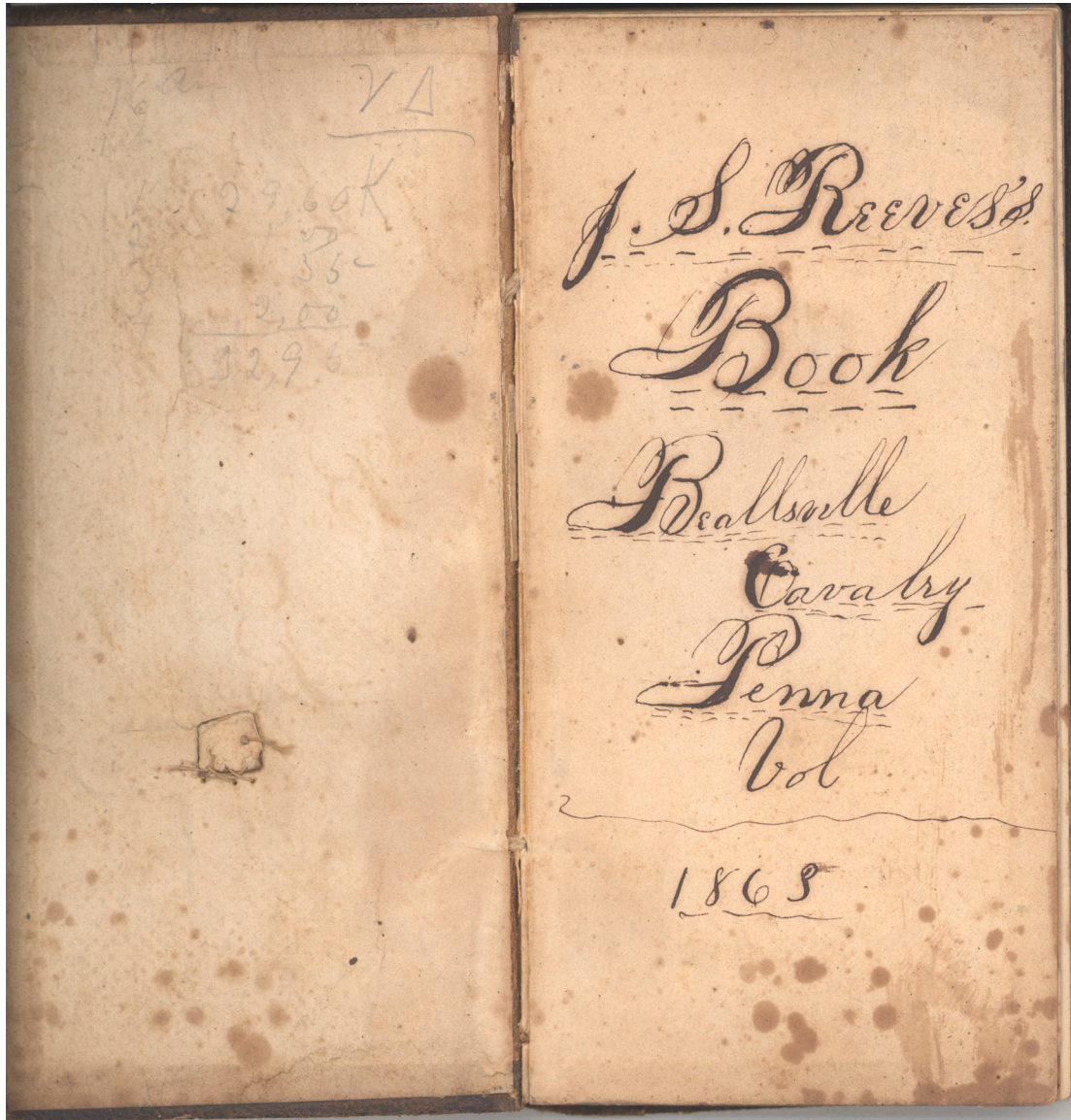
FOREWORD

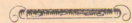

RATES OF POSTAGE.

LETTERS not exceeding 1-2 ounce in weight, to any part of the United States, not over 3000 miles, 3 cents. If over 3000 miles, 10 cents. (California and Oregon, 10 cents.) Letters weighing over 1-2 ounce, and not over 1 ounce, double these rates. *Must be prepaid in all cases.*

DROP LETTERS, 1 cent. Must be prepaid.

ADVERTISED LETTERS, 1 cent, in addition to the regular rates.

VALUABLE LETTERS may be registered by application at the office of mailing, and the payment of a registration fee of 5 cents.

TO CANADA and other British North American Provinces, when not over 3000 miles, 10 cents for each 1-2 ounce. When over 3000 miles, 15 cents. Prepayment optional.

TO GREAT BRITAIN or Ireland, 24 cents; but if sent to or from California or Oregon, 29 cents. Prepayment optional.

TO FRANCE, 15 cents for each 1-4 ounce. Prepayment optional.

LETTERS to other FOREIGN COUNTRIES vary in rate according to the route by which they are sent, and the proper information can be obtained of any Postmaster in the United States.

NEWSPAPERS, Periodicals, Unsealed Circulars, or other articles of printed matter (except books), when sent to any part of the United States, and weighing not over 3 ounces, 1 cent, and for every additional ounce, or part thereof, 1 cent. If within the State, and not weighing over 1 1-2 ounces, 1-2 cent.

WEEKLY NEWSPAPERS (one copy only) sent to actual Subscribers within the County where printed and published, FREE.

PRINTED BOOKS, bound or unbound, not weighing over 4 lbs., for any distance under 3000 miles, 1 cent per oz.; over 3000 miles, 2 cents per oz. The above must be prepaid.

DAGUERREOTYPES will be charged with letter postage by weight.

BLANKS in packages weighing not less than 8 ounces, and packages of seeds or cuttings, not more than 8 ounces in weight, 1 cent an ounce or fraction of an ounce under 1,500 miles; over 1,500 miles, 2 cents per ounce or fraction of an ounce.

NO PACKAGE will be forwarded (except books) which weighs over 3 pounds.

Finally, the larger tide of the day is distinguished by the letter (l), and the smaller by (s).

Morning warm and cloudy we are advancing toward Hagerstown to cut off the retreat of the Rebels. Reached Hancock at Dark where we halted and it Rained all night.

WEDNESDAY 8

Morning still raining the River is so high that the Rebels cannot get across the River. 5 O'clock in the evening it has cleared off we are now waiting for orders to move to meet Gen Lee army at Williamsport 22 miles from here.

THURSDAY, JULY 9, 1863.

Morning warm. Capt Greenfield had a sharp skirmish yesterday with Imboden's Cavalry and captured their wagon train afternoon in camp here. no thing new going on at present evening we are camping in camp.

FRIDAY 10

Morning clear and very warm Gen Stoneman Reported to be on the opposite side of the River from Lee's Army. River still high. We are all advancing down the river. The Ringold Cavalry had a fight this afternoon had 1 man mortally wounded.

SATURDAY 11

Morning cloudy still marching toward Williamsport 8 O'clock halted and rested until 7 O'clock in the evening when we again moved forward 4 miles and stopped for the night.

SUNDAY, JULY 12, 1863.

Morning clear and pleasant firing heard in the direction of Williamsport. Gen. Mead pressing close upon the rear of the Rebels. Night we move to Fairview and camped. heavy cannonading heard in the direction of the Rebels coming.

MONDAY 13

Morning still raining I am on Picket to day Cannonading commenced at day light and continued all day. Evening the Rebels are crossing the River at Williamsport. Night raining very hard we are in a house in the town of Clear Spring.

TUESDAY 14

Morning our forces are on the move. after marching 6 miles we find the Rebels have crossed into Virginia we are halted 3 miles from Williamsport. Afternoon we came back to Clear Spring and camped for the night. Gen Mead is after the Rebels across the River.

THURSDAY, JULY 9, 1863.

Morning warm. Capt Greenfield had a sharp skirmish yesterday with Imboden's cavalry and Captured their wagon train afternoon in Camp here no thing new going on at present evening we are Laying in Camp.

FRIDAY 10

morning clear and very warm Gen Stoneman Reported to be on the opposite side of the River from Lee's army. River still high. we are all advancing down the River the Ringold Cavalry had a fight this afternoon had one man mortally wounded

SATURDAY 11

Morning Cloudy still marching toward Williamsport 8 O clock halted and rested until 7 O clock in the evening when we again moved forward 4 miles and stopped for the night

SUNDAY, JULY 12, 1863.

MONDAY 13

Morning still raining I am on Picket to day Cannonading commenced at day light and continued all day. Evening the Rebs are crossing the River at Williamsport. Night raining very hard we are in a house in the town of clear spring

TUESDAY 14

Morning our forces are on the move. after marching 6 miles we find the Rebels have crossed into Virginia We are halted 3 miles from Williamsport. Afternoon we came back to Clear Spring and camped for the night. Gen Mead is after the Rebels across the River.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 15, 1863.

Morning again on the march we are going to cross the River at Cherry run. 12 O'clock arrived at the River and got Boats ready to cross. evening our advance is across the river. Kelleys division is crossing here. Our Company all got safely over the river. weather very warm

Morning clear. we appear to have run against Lee's whole Army for we are ordered to retreat across the Potomac. We started at 8 O'clock this evening and came to Cherry Run and forded the River with all our force 12 O'clock

TUESDAY, JULY 21, 1863.

Morning clear Gen Lee reported to be pursuing us with 35,000 men. It is said his retreat toward Richmond was cut off and he concluded to try another trip into West Virginia. Skirmishing on the opposite side of the river with our Pickets some cannonading.

WEDNESDAY 22

Morning all quiet and weather pleasant. Our trains out for hay I am a long late after good dinner with an old Farmer. afternoon the Rebels and our troops are fighting on the Va side of the River night camped in the woods weather pleasant.

THURSDAY 23

Morning warm some talk of our moving back over the River. My news in camp except order to go back into Virginia tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock arrived at Back Creek in the evening.

FRIDAY, JULY 24, 1863.

Morning pleasant no news of importance except that the Rebels are retreating up the Valley of Virginia they are about Marched out and a scout of our Cavalry is ordered out in pursuit of them, night pleasant.
